Since then, January has been a time to acknowledge those experiencing enslavement and those who have escaped. Although slavery is commonly thought to be a thing of the past, human traffickers generate hundreds of billions of dollars in profits by trapping millions of people in horrific situations around the world, including here in the U.S. Traffickers use violence, threats, deception, debt bondage, and other manipulative tactics to force people to engage in commercial sex or to provide labor or services against their will. 

Partnership Spotlight:

We want to use our Partnership Spotlight to showcase the backbone of Hub City Outreach Center. There are many stakeholders in and sectors of the community that have a huge say and impact on the decisions, events, and things that we do for Lubbock. The sectors of our target area include parents, youth, adults, concerned citizens, businesses, media, law enforcement, health care providers and community-and youth-serving organizations, schools/colleges/universities and religious/fraternal organizations. Our Board of Directors are our guiding hands; members of the Lubbock Community. Without further ado, we introduce, our Board of Directors:

First, Dr. Flores, She is a TTHSC School of Health Professions and Masters of Healthcare Admin Department Assistant Program Director and also an Assistant Professor. In case you're new with us, AgriLife Extension has programs ranging from youth and adult education, military programs, financial management, weight control, older adults & aging, physical activity, nutrition, diabetic management, passenger and community saftey +more!! They really provide a wide range of services around Texas, and yes, we are lucky enough to have them here as well. Nancy herself started the Lubbock Area Teen Pregnancy Prevention Coalition (LATPPC) from the ground up. The LATPPC focus on positive youth development, parent and teen education, community information, harm reduction, as well as, creating opportunities to address issues surrounding teen pregnancy. A wonderful asset for our youth and for women all over!

Last but certainly not least... Mr. Sipriano Gutierrez with YoungScholarsUSA. Sip has worked in prevention and coalition for many, many years. He started YoungScholarsUSA, a scholarship program for youth, based out of the Lubbock Boys & Girls Optimist Club. In addition to providing youth scholarships for school, he also has ran three Anti-Drug Coalitions in Lubbock County and Hockley County.

Together, these five members are our governing Board. We know each of these individuals on a personal, professional and aspirational level. We understand their passion for enhancing lives of others in physical, occupational, spiritual, social, financial, emotional, developmental and intellectual wellness. Voice of Hope provides critical crisis intervention to those affected by sexual violence. Originally established in 1975 as the Lubbock Rape Crisis Center, the agency rebranded as Voice of Hope in 2012. The agency is the second oldest Rape Crisis Center in the State of Texas. Over the last 45 years, we have served over 11,000 survivors. In 2019, we served 460 survivors. 60 of those cases include survivors of sex trafficking. Within Lubbock from 2018 to the end of 2019, the Special Operations Section of the Lubbock Police Department conducted 86 investigations in human trafficking, which resulted in 58 arrests, all of which involved sex trafficking.

Our services include a 24 crisis hotline, medical accompaniment, law enforcement accompaniment, counseling, and case managers to assist victims of sexual assault or sex trafficking with their healing process. It is important to remember that all of our services are offered free of charge to the survivor and their family members. Rape is a crime that impacts everyone. In addition to direct services, Voice of Hope reaches out and provides training to the Lubbock community and surrounding 11 counties. Our trained educators offer training on healthy relationships, online safety, sexting, signs of sex trafficking and several others. The staff and volunteers are happy to come and speak to any group. Requests can be called into the office at 806-763-3232.

April 25th, Voice of Hope will host our 13th annual Walk A Mile In Her Shoes fundraiser. This fundraiser put the fun back in fundraising! Men are asked to walk a mile in red stilettos. It is a family event and high heel shoes are encouraged but not required. We do have shoes that can be borrowed for the walk. We will have games and activities for all ages. Registration for this event can be found at VoiceofHopeLubbock.org or on our Facebook page Voice of Hope Lubbock. Without the support of the Lubbock community, Voice of Hope would not be able to continue our legacy of providing personal advocacy for victims of sexual violence.
